Steam Trains to Balmoral...?

You may have noticed some activity around the site of the old railway station in recent weeks. Survey pegs have gone in along the old siding and there has been some clearing of the regrowth. Last month the Railway Museum in Thirlmere was given an extension on its lease to include Balmoral and some of its members are preparing a proposal to their governing Board to terminate the steam trains at Balmoral instead of Buxton.

From my talks with people so far, some are very much in favour. They see new commercial opportunities and the tourists bringing benefit to existing small businesses. Others have expressed concern, seeing the increased road traffic and people as a disruption to the peaceful country atmosphere of the Village.

I think that there are many questions that need to be answered before an informed conclusion can be made. This proposal has major implications for the environment of our Village and it is important that residents express an opinion and have an input into the proposal.

If the proposal is accepted by the Museum Board it will still be a long time before we actually seen the trains as much rail maintenace has to be undertaken.

The Association will devote its next meeting to discussion of this topic and will invite someone from the museum to answer questions.

Welcome to Balmoral

For many years the sign with this message has hung on the walls of the Fireshed facing Wilson's Drive. It dates from the early '70's when Ron and Libby Brown lived here (at Balmoral Lodge, ed.). Ron was an engineer with the Dept. of Motor Transport (now R.T.A.) working on the bridges for the new F4 freeway. In a letter to the Intercommunity Ron recalled the origin of the sign.

Welcome to Balmoral

Sometime about May 1973 the Welcome to Balmoral sign was erected on the railway platform building at Balmoral.

The sign had been made by the RTA's signwriter Mike Carrig at the Picton Works Office. Mike was a true craftsman who always added some extra class to all hs signwriting jobs. He was proud of his craft and often drank a toast to celebrate his achievments. The drink also seemed to steady his hand.

Travellers on the loop line would no longer ponder where they were as the Sunday evening train to Sydney came to a stop at Balmoral Station to pick up just one and sometimes two passengers. Half asleep they would wipe their eyes and gape with amazement at the site of John Meredith and/or Mrs Gadsen being farewelled from Balmoral by a joyful band of locals with goblets full of wine or glasses of beer.

The train would slowly pull away from the platform accompanied by much waving and cheering from the party left behind.

The sigh became a landmark and a symbol of the warmth and comradeship enjoyed by the small community living in Balmoral Village. It was a sign not just for those passing through but was a comforting greeting to those living in the village each time they returned to their homes.
