Did you know:

Balmoral Village is situated in the tract of country originally known in 1820 as "Kennedys Brush", and lies south of the Bargo Brush which gave its name to the present town of Bargo. The older aboriginal name of "Merrigong" has never been fully recognized. Our Village is situated on what is apparently the Merrigong Range which is the main height of land which runs from Thirlmere and trends southwards to junction with the Mittagong Range at the head of the Nattai River. It appears the natives used it as a territorial route and made it known to the explorers Kennedy, Throsby and others.
